Executive Summary

Medical Impact Sierra Leone humanitarian medical organization working in hard-to-reach and underserved environments, with a strong focus on community leadership, public health system support, and policy-relevant advocacy.

Provide primary care, and strengthen local health care capacity in 5 districts, working with communities where medical care is often unavailable or out of reach.

Medical Impact Sierra Leone MISL seek to enhance the collective impact of medical outreach teams by improving the conduct of MISL medical brigade, and how they share knowledge to increase local health delivery capabilities.

In the world of fundraising, funders (parent body) visits are a blend of strategy, communication, and relationship-building. Ultimately, a successful parent funder visit is the result of a well-prepared plan and a genuine commitment to maintaining a strong connection. Donor visits are no different setting out on a journey without a destination in mind even though it's crucial to have clear objectives for each visit whether seeking financial support, building rapport, or sharing updates.

Problem:

Medical Impact Sierra Leone is struggling with donor in-roads and penetrating the world of running an NGO, retention and attracting potential donors, considering partnering, and meeting intervention standards.

Gaps still exist in quality community outreach, inadequate data availability to enhance quality reporting.



AIM:

The goal is to improve health outcomes by growing MISL teams' ability to address long-term community health needs through sustainable partnerships and potential donor driven strives for quality medical donations.

Objectives:

1. To strengthen collaboration and create lasting impact, maintain Communication, and standard practice in line with partners' priority;
2. To improve data collection and reporting to demonstrate partnership credibility and enhance funders retention.

Justification:

The activities so gear up embark on a journey that can shape the future of MISL through the power of meaningful funder/partner relationships.

These activities help ensure sustained community engagements and nurtures good relationship with potential partners.

Helps acquire technical skills and knowledge in lifesaving medical care and resource mobilization through training.

Create a foundation for successful interactions that can lead to operations/health interventions lasting partnerships



Strategy:

Prioritizing careful preparation and thoughtful follow-up, to create a foundation for successful interactions that can lead to lasting partnerships.

ACTIVITY:

1. World Condom day commemoration in Mile 91.
2. Preparation and coordination for the visit of the Medical Impact Mexico CEO and Team in Sierra Leone.
3. Free malaria and BP diagnosis and treatment.
4. MISL in collaboration with CEO engagement with institutions such as Global Fund, NMCP, Pharmaceutical Board, SLCS
5. Training of MISL Executive staff on capacity building and development

OUTPUT:

1. MISL in collaboration with NAS Partnership organized 2 day World Condom commemoration in Mile 91, from 13th and 14th February, 2026.

The aim is to promote awareness for the World Condom Day and encouraged condom use particularly among adolescence.

MISL participated in the condom use symposium at the Central University, Mile 91.

- Over 400 participants attended.
- Football match of 4 teams logged on.

OUTCOME:

- Over 380 spectators sensitized on condom use and awareness raised on the importance of World Condom Day
- Over 20,000 condoms and other reproductive health products (IEC, lubricants, HIV testing, counselling etc.) Exhibited.
- About 500 audience received/accessed variety of condoms and other reproductive health products during the night carnival.

Coordination for the visit of CEO Medical Impact Mexico

The objective is to have a well-collaborated ready plan with a genuine commitment to ensure a successful stay of the CEO and team in Sierra Leone.

I. MISL trained 6 volunteers (5 District coordinators, and 1 medical team lead) on coordination of district activities for February month.

II. District coordinators and MISL executive engaged with the District Medical Officials DMOs regarding the activity plan for the visit of the Medical Impact International CEO and team in Sierra Leone.

Outcome:

- Six volunteers (5 district Coordinators and 1 medical team lead) received training and acquired knowledge and skills on coordinating district activities of MISL
- A unified proficient CEO visit plan of activities set and adopted through consultations with 5 DMOs and 7 directors of institution reached



OUT PUT 3

Simulations of Free malaria diagnosis and treatment, Moyamba and Western Urban:

- At Seweima village, Bumpeh chiefdom Moyamba district Dainkeh Primary school was the service point of the meeting on the 20th /2/2026.
- Three area units (Triage unit, test unit and health talk unit) opened to screening based on symptoms and suspected cases tested. If positive, treatment and or referral is required.
- Targeted beneficiaries include U5 children, Pregnant, lactating mothers, and aged.

OUT COME:

- 106 participants sensitized during health talk about the causes, prevention, control and expected behavioral change practices of blood pressure BP and malaria.
 - 12 screened and tested for malaria. Results revealed that 4 are malaria positive and 8 negative but 2 experienced high fevers.
 - 90% not screened due to the late arrival of the outreach team in Seweima village.
 - 2 experienced high BP. Inderal tabs administered followed by counselling.
- Forah Bay community simulation for free malaria diagnosis and treatment.
- 13 participants attended and 5 tested for malaria.
 - 0 positive, 1 had high blood readings and Counseled and referred to Rotufunck CHC.

MISL in collaboration with CEO engagement with 7 institutions

The engagement purpose is to initiate and strengthens partnership then find out where gaps exist which MISL can possibly fill or collaborate.

- MISL, held stakeholders' engagements with seven institutions (Global Fund Sierra Leone, National Aids Secretariat NAS, National Drug Agency, National Malaria Control Program NMCP, Pharmaceutical Board, National, Correctional Services (prisons), Seweima communities and DHMT Moyamba) in Western Urban and Moyamba district during separate and exclusive visits to create and strengthen links for resource sharing.

OUTCOME:

- MISL initiated 2 new partnership endeavors with Global Fund, and Pharmaceutical Board.
- Strengthens cooperation with existing partners for collaborative health interventions.

5. OUT PUT:

- Training of MISL Executive on capacity building and development
- Training of MISL Executive staff is aimed at strengthening skills on capacity building and development.
- MISL Executive members fully participated in a successful 8 days training sessions (17th-28/29th Feb) for institutional capacity building on quality community outreach, quality data management and reporting, adopting CANVA tool, advocacy for resource mobilization and communication as well as project risk management, facilitated by Dr. Giorgio Alberto Franyuti Kelly and Gabriel Sanchez from Medical Impact Mexico
- Conduct outdoor activity in 2 separate occasions at Number 2 beach and Lakka beach.

OUT COME:

- 8 MISL executive capacitated with technical skills and knowledge on quality community outreach, resource mobilization, quality data management and reporting.
- Medical Impact Sierra Leone received consignment of reporting tools (1 water resistant camera and 1 lap top-pad computer).
- Engagements sessions with leadership and team of Health Departments, Agencies and other institutions revealed some gaps that MISL is opportune to take advantage of, and build ties or strengthen relationships.
- Beach sessions' produce recreation, relief, and reflection among MISL team.

The resources used include:

I. Funding:

This Activities were supported by Medical Impact Mexico, through cash transfer; member's subscription and FAPO CBO support.

II. Materials:

- -Hired public transport (Car, motto bikes)
- - Daily Subsistence Allowance DSA
- -Office running expenses
- - Banners, stationery
- -Food and drinks
- -Camera
- -Laptops

III. Personnel involved.

Beneficiaries:

I. Central University Mile 91, schools, the forces, traders, drivers and bike riders that attended the World Condom Day celebrations.

II. MISL Team (8 Executives, 5 District Coordinators, 1 Medical Team Lead, and 2 Office volunteers).

III. Mothers and their babies, pregnant women, local authorities in Bumpeh chiefdom.

IV. 6 communities in Moyamba and 1community, Western Area.

V. 7 institutions in the health sector (NMCP, NAS, SLCS, Global Fund, Pharmaceutical Board, National Public Health Regulatory Agency and DHMT).

Beneficiaries:

I. Transportation barriers in reaching targeted PHUs in 3 districts (Kono, Port Loko and Kambia) was not possible.

II. Funding inadequacy due to extended period of visit

Sustainability Plan:

- Develop malaria diagnosis and treatment guidelines for MISL outreach in line with that of the National Malaria control Program
- Conduct a baseline survey on assessment of all the PHU infrastructure status that MISL covers.
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- Identify and increase engagement with potential funders/donors to enhance healthy resource mobilization for competitive advantage
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- Develop attractive proposals for funding MISL programs.

Conclusions and Lessons Learned:

In the world of nonprofit fundraising, parent funders' visits are like windows of opportunity. These in-person interactions offer a chance to build meaningful relationships, share MISL impact, and secure vital support.

The purpose of February activities is to improve health outcomes of the communities in the 5 districts MISL covers. Collaboration strengthened to create lasting impact, communication and standard practice improved such as data collection and reporting to demonstrate partnership credibility to enhance lasting funding. Quality malaria outreach conducted in Moyamba and Western Urban through improved data collection and reporting.

Eventually, a fruitful donor visit is the result of a well-prepared plan and a genuine commitment to maintaining a strong connection.

Key lessons learnt include:

- Bureaucracy is sometimes a barrier in reaching appointment request schedules.
- Good relations and potential links are critical.
- Achieving MISL short and long-term plans can be enhanced by thinking ahead and anticipating challenges, we can proactively address challenges, rather than constantly reacting to crises.

Recommendations:

- Adopting proactive leadership strategies, such as setting clear priorities, building a strong team, strengthen partnership, and Capacity Building, to maintain Sustainability).
- Conduct a base-line survey on assessing the structures of PHUs status covered by MISL.
- -Develop and adopt best practice guidelines for MISL medical outreach
